the men was found
out with the oxen
the whips was
cracking the chains
rattling the men
swaring the women
tiring and the oxen
lawling and upon
the hole it was
one of the times
that we were read of
when the women
would git out of
hummer they was.

Setup by 11th
nearly just whispering Oregon in thare
ear - & O go - away -
wold be the reply
but about 9 o'clock we
got up and traveled
about 10 m. and
encamped on the
middle fork of the
Spariton we had
some rain in the nig
ht, and our tent
fell down in the

ran under our bed
and wet threw the
bed we laid on, but
this is a mere
circumstance all
for Oregon.

by road that swarmed like agate stars and
as looking about we was somewhat alarmed at theumblebee and resembled

the backs this was something new to me & here we went
& children was in the all together round & round
wagon & with there heads about 2 hours then
stuck out as thick as the bugs appeared to settle

eat no grass. here is salt

water little grass - rough

buffalo in sight we
past - in alkali today

the immigrants has fed.

July 15th
we left camp early and
travelled about 18 miles
and encamped at the Devil's
gate or gap 10 m. that us

rock is of gray granite &

3 hundred yards long & 150
wide & 75 or 80 feet high

it is about 6'00 feet
deep & 100 feet wide a perpendicular

July 11th
we remain in camp for
the purpose of washing
& to let our cattle rest
as grass is good "if" I
killed an antelope today
I was out hunting with
some up the party and we
found a pond of water at
a very high point & there
was live indeed in it the
pond was of considerable
size & large that we put
the name of it took off
our clothes and went in
swimming but it was
very cold if you believe
me that pond was
at least 15 hundred feet
high

July, Sun 18th
we found that up our
passes was gone this morning
we started an hour or
two later and found them about
or 12 m. from camp. There
was some of the party that
that there was unapplying
the Indians but it is very
uncertain this kept us
till noon and then found
that they would not start
until the next day
well as we had never had
any game they had best
have on so when night
came told was east to see who
should stand the first night
& it fell on me for one
& S.R. for another just
the one that I wanted for
I knew that and when
cold naf git to camp
without me knowing some
thing about it

but for the first tiny miles it is white around
we got away on wheels on the edge at this pond where
laid it on some pieces of the sun has made it
aditch then piled the
ditch with dry pine & set
pine to it & you had
better believe we had a fire
we spent over time in haul-
ing about the pine & when
we got sleepy we set the
watch ahead to 12:00 & then
we called the next watch
& went to bed

July 19, 1911
we traveled about 18.m. &
encamped 1.m. north of the
rock on the R. here we are
within 1.m. of a lake of
salaratus this lake or
pond - has several acors in
it and the salaratus is
to be got here almost
as pretty as that they
make in the states
it can be seen for

July 20th
this day we traveled
about 20 m. & encamped
in now wet bottom grass
good we past threw the
narrows today this is the
point of two mountains
that comes so near together
that there is just a narrow
gap where the creek runs
thru. & the rock goes
in the creek for some distance
when we drove in
here this looked like
running into the ground
there is orange ab bars bluffs
on our right & on our left
about 10 m. there is orange

mountains mostly covered
with timber we crossed
the creek several times and
had considerable sand & debris.
This day's drive brought us
in sight of the bare
capped Mountains.

mon 21

we traveled about 16 m.
today, 10 m. brought us to the
R. after passing over a plain
that is almost entirely
deserted - no vegetation save
the sage. There is some grass
along the R. but it is
short. The grass on this
stream (sweet water) is
mostly blue grass & red
top 6 m. further brought
us to the R again - here
we encamped grass very
short - over that day

we traveled about 12 m.

up the R 2 m. then we
met some of very rough
bedrock past sheer ledges of
rocks. That was entirely
we had nearly 4 m. further

but the sage which
is the only flower.

grass is halo. The Wind R.

15 or 20 m. to our right
they have a grand appearan-
ce the snow looks as cold
as it did in the states

This day we got plenty up

ice this was very cooling

There is some breads here
that are there was snow
here 10 inches deep on the
4 day of July and it
is mostly gone now and
the weather is very hot

The plain here is extrem-

ly bare

July 24th

This morning we left
camp early gradually
ascended the ridge for 8 m.
which beat us in sight
of the Pacific Springs
here we had Oregon
admiral looking place
for the sage is the only
thing that is here
now after slaying our

horses & taking a good look
at the surrounding country
we gradually descended the
ridge to the springs
this is the first water
that runs in to the
Pacific here is another
of large springs that
form a branch here we
encamped we took our
stock 4 m. north for
grass here we have plenty
of sage

July 25th

This day we laid in camp
for the purpose of resting
our cattle to wash & get
some fire the party spent
the time in various
amusement as for myself
accompanied with father
hays we took some
wagon tire to the top of
the ridge and let them
go this was about 1 m.
